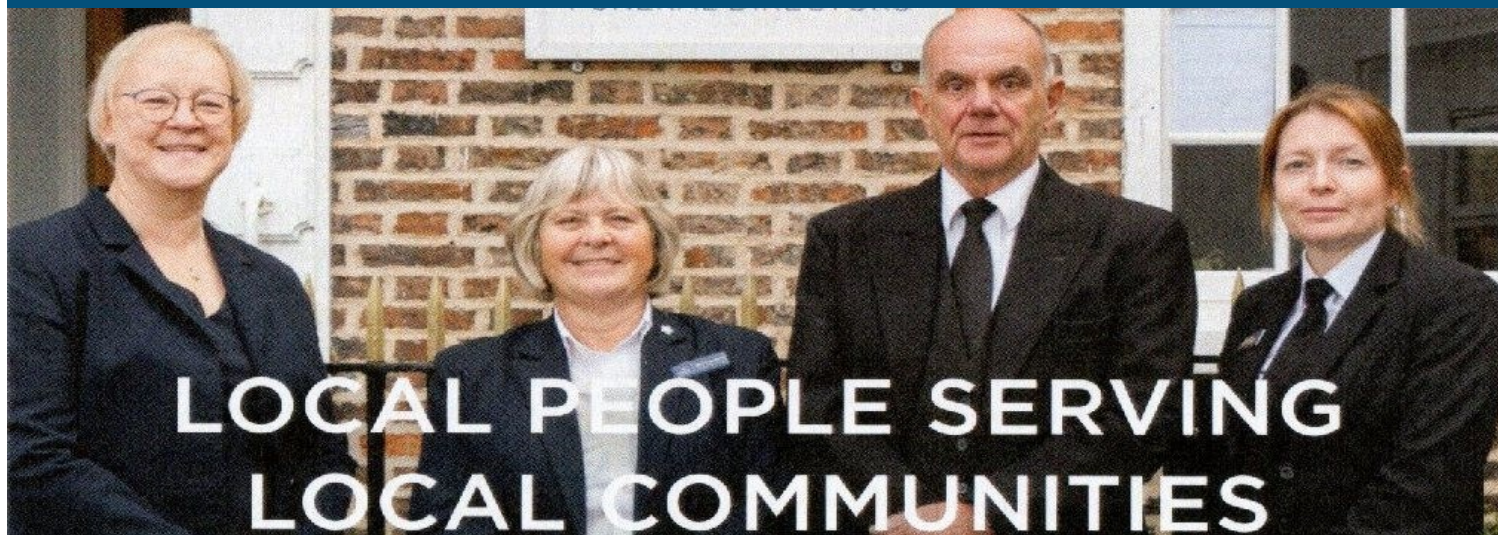

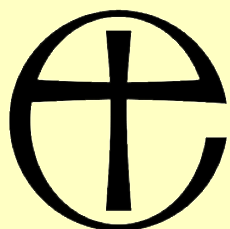

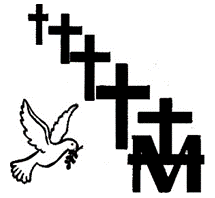

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From Rev'd Richard Grant



The church year hurtles onwards: The festivity of Epiphany is nearly through, and the austerity of Lent beckons. But let's not be too hasty to get there, but rather pause, take a breath, and raise our eyes to the hills. Living in North Yorkshire means Psalm 121 is never far from my thoughts, and its comforting words often come to my mind when I'm out and about:

**I lift up my eyes to the hills.
From where does my help come?
My help comes from the Lord
who made heaven and earth.**

As the year rushes onwards, it's easy to feel you're struggling to keep up. Perhaps you're already behind on work this year, or just haven't kept up with everything you planned to. It's very easy when we're feeling swamped to focus in on the thing we're struggling with, or to end up with head bowed, staring at the floor. Instead, the psalmist invites us to do the opposite. To take a look at the bigger picture, to lift up our heads instead of lowering them.

I'm quite good at rushing onwards into the next job, and quite bad at stopping to take a breath – by the time you're reading this I'll be under Doctor's orders to rest, and I have to say I'm not looking forward to being confined to the house for three weeks. However, I know I need to take my own advice – to lift my head, look at that bigger picture, and see that some rest, even if unwanted, will set me up well for the year ahead of us.

The psalm goes on to remind us that God is no human guardian, checking in on us from time to time, but is eternally present. God doesn't rest and doesn't sleep, but is watching over us night and day. There whenever we need someone to turn to. When I look up and see the hills on the horizon, that's what I remember, and it cheers my heart.

I don't know what's going on for you at the minute, what you're dealing with, who you are having to watch over. But I do know that the God who made the hills is watching over you.

If you have concerns for someone's welfare or for how they are being treated, then report it to the parish, safeguarding officer or the Vicar, who will deal with the problem confidentially.

Our prayer is that we all work together to make our church community as safe as possible for everyone so that it continues to grow and flourish.

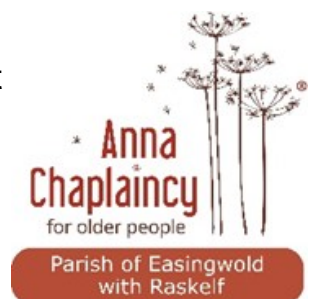
They hope to bridge gaps where other services are not able to help, to support the isolated, listen to the lonely, comfort the bereaved and sit with the dying.

CHARITY DONATIONS

For several years your PCC has, on behalf of both congregations, sent donations to six local charitable organisations, just prior to Christmas.

For Christmas 2025 we sent £700 each to Carecent, Cozie, EDCCA, St Leonard's Hospice and Yorkshire Air Ambulance, and £500 to Autism Plus. A total of £4000.

In addition, £474 in private donations were sent to the Children's Society.

We have received warm letters of appreciation from all the recipients.

A PRAYER FOR THE KIND OF PEACE THAT DOESN'T BEHAVE

Good and loving God, we were taught to pray for peace. For calm. For things to settle down.

Let Love disturb us.

Where there is injury, teach us how to tend wounds gently,
and also how to ask why those wounds keep happening over and over again.

Let Love disturb us.

Where there is despair, give us hope that doesn't flinch.

Hope that doesn't disappear when things get awkward or costly. Hope that stays.

And where there is darkness give us light; not the kind that makes everything feel better,
but the kind that shows us what we'd rather not see.

Let Love disturb us.

Where we've grown numb, shake us awake. Where we've gone along to get along, interrupt us.
Where tradition matters more to us than actual human lives, and we benefit from that, even quietly,
don't let us pretend we don't notice.

Love keeps whispering and sometimes shouting, that gentleness isn't weakness,
and kindness isn't passivity, and that silence is not peace.

Because peace without justice isn't peace. It's just harm with better manners.

Let Love disturb us.

Disturb our comfort. Disturb the excuses we make when we can sleep at night.

Disturb the ways we call convenience "faith".

Mess with our calendars. Mess with our mobey.

Mess with the tables where we decide who gets a seat and who doesn't.

Let Love disturb us.

Help us want more than being understood. Help us want understanding.

Help us want more than being liked. Help us want to love in ways that actually cost us something.

Not just talking about justice, but practicing it. With our bodies. With our choices. With our lives.

Move us closer to those pushed to the edges.

Teach us how to love without fixing, without saving, without standing at a safe distance.

Make us channels, not just of peace, but of disruption.

Let Love disturb us,

Until Love refuses to settle for the world as it is.

Amen.

It includes periods of music and silent meditation



In today's culture this is an opportunity of being together in a reflective mood including silence. After a brief period of spoken reflection we experience some reflective music. We then enter a period of silent meditation for about 20-25 minutes. Some people use a 4-beat mantra such as "Ma-ra-na-tha" (or Come Lord Jesus), said twice, (not out loud!) breathing in and then when breathing out. After this, another period of music precedes a final prayer. It doesn't suit everyone but it is something worth trying. Sometimes we have a few comments, even laughter, afterwards! In today's busy-ness people often find this simple and yet cathartic. Even children in school use silence as a restful experience!

Perhaps, give it a try? Join us, you are most welcome.
