From Rev'd Robin Davill



Although Easter Sunday falls on the last day of March I hope I can be forgiven for wishing everyone a joyous Easter in the April magazine.

Easter, once you get past bunnies and eggs, is not an easy time to talk about. St Mark's Gospel, probably the earliest account, puts it quite starkly. Three women go to the tomb early in the morning—they find the massive stone rolled away, the body of Jesus has disappeared, and a mysterious figure in white is sitting in its place. They are told that Jesus is risen and they will see him in Galilee. Is this a happy ending and are they reassured? No, they flee from the tomb and say nothing to anyone because they are afraid.

Fortunately for us the other Gospels try and fill in more details. There are a mixture of stories and certain common themes. Firstly, the importance of the role of Mary Magdalene, who is the first to see the risen Jesus. Secondly, the women are told first, and the men "mansplain" it away as idle tales. Thirdly, there are a number of quite detailed resurrection appearances to his followers, such as at Emmaus and by the sea shore. St Matthew adds an attempt by the Temple Authorities to portray the events as a conspiracy by the apostles to steal the body of Jesus and thus pretend he has risen from the dead on the grounds that the tomb is now empty.

Interestingly, the authorities are deliberately suppressing what they know to be the truth, because they have the only first hand witness accounts of the resurrection, namely the testimony of the soldiers who guarded the tomb. Why do they do this, we might ask? When truth speaks to power, power often just does what it wants anyway. Ask the Post Office!

That Jesus existed, taught, did remarkable things and was crucified, can be established by other historical accounts such as Josephus and Tacitus as well as the Gospels. That He was the son of God and that He rose from the dead cannot. The only eye witnesses never recorded their accounts—the authorities edited them out of history if Matthew's account is correct. And that I believe was part of God's plan. It is always a matter of faith. God does not compel but invites. Do we accept His Easter invitation to believe?

#### HOW AND WHY DO WE PRAY? WHAT OPPORTUNITIES DO WE HAVE TO PRAY?

It has come to our attention that "Prayer", when we talk about it in church or in the magazine, can be somewhat confusing! It isn't Prayer itself that confuses us, for we are told that we should "pray as we can, and not as we can't". Each individual will pray in their own way. However, there are so many things that we feel we need to pray about. We want to give thanks; to say we are sorry; to intercede for others as well as for ourselves. Praying builds our relationship with God, through Jesus. It is something we can all do. We don't need particular skills, and for once age doesn't matter! As well as individual prayer, praying together is also important – "When two or three are gathered together in my name, I will grant their requests."

When we pray our own personal prayers, perhaps we can enlarge our vision a little by being prompted to pray for things we might not have thought of - in our church, the Church, our communities, the wider world.

There are several ways of doing this:

The magazine Prayer Cycle which offers four ideas for each month, and covers the whole of Raskelf and Easingwold each year.

The Prayer Cycle for the Parish Church and Raskelf, praying for our Vicar and the many people who are involved in a multitude of different ways.

The Prayer Circle which is a small group of people (it could be larger) who pray confidentially for those who ask for prayer for a particular need

In today's culture this is an opportunity of being together in a reflective mood including silence. After a brief period of spoken reflection we experience some reflective music. We then enter a period of silent meditation for about 20-25 minutes. Some people use a 4-beat mantra such as "Ma-ra-na-tha" (or Come Lord Jesus), said twice, (not out loud!) breathing in and then when breathing out.

After this, another period of music precedes a final prayer. It doesn't suit everyone but it is something worth trying. Sometimes we have a few comments, even laughter, afterwards! In today's busy-ness people often find this simple and yet cathartic. Even children in school use silence as a restful experience!

#### **Church Digital Giving**

Since last October, many of you will have noticed an electronic device at the back of Easingwold church.

The CollecTin WiFi terminal enables the contactless collection of donations and has been provided free by York Diocese as part of the Church of England's National Giving Team 3 year project to help thousands of churches get started with digital giving.



In the same way that many people use contactless payment cards in shops and cafés, the CollecTin allows the use of all the usual contactless debit and credit cards as well as Apple Pay and Google Pay mobile devices by selecting one of the four set amounts on the screen, or choose your own amount, and then tap your card or mobile device on the top to make the donation.

The amount is then automatically credited securely through the banking system to the Easingwold PCC church bank account for the benefit of Easingwold and Raskelf churches.

The CollecTin system does involve a small processing charge for the church but all cash donations involve a bank charge as well as taking time and effort on the part of a church volunteer to handle the cash and pay it into the bank.

# We hope that more visitors to the church will use the CollecTin to make a donation instead of giving cash.
