

Dear Friends,



THE WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY 18TH – 25TH JANUARY 2024



“GO AND DO LIKEWISE”

The parable of the Good Samaritan is one of the best known passages of Scripture, yet one that never seems to lose its power to challenge indifference to suffering and to inspire solidarity. It is a story about crossing boundaries that calls our attention to the bonds that unite the whole human family.

In this Week of Prayer for Christian Unity the Church is being challenged to stop and tend to the wounded and, in so doing, to recognise our own wounds as churches and as communities. Facing the reality of our own brokenness helps to connect us to the suffering of others from a place of humility and deep empathy, creating a sacred space of encounter inspired by Christ's healing love.

In choosing this passage of Scripture for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, the churches of Burkina Faso have invited us to join with them in a process of self-reflection as they consider what it means to love our neighbour in the midst of a security crisis. How good and pleasant it is when brothers dwell in unity (Psalm 133v1)

JOSEPH AND THE MINCE PIES

I hoped my mum was not going to be angry with me. It was my birthday and she wanted me to have something special, but she doesn't have very much money. Since my Dad died a couple of years ago, she has struggled to make ends meet. She takes in washing and sells some of the stuff she can grow, as well as eggs from the chickens and some milk from the cow. I help her as much as I can, but she says I must go to the little school that the Rabbi runs, so I can't help her all the time. And I want to learn as much as I can so that when I grow up I may be able to get a proper job and look after her when she gets old.

But, as I said, it was my birthday, so she got out her last few coins and said:

"Joseph, run down to the Bethlehem Bakery and get two of those little pies he makes, with the figs and dried fruit. We can have them as a special treat for your birthday, after supper."

So I held the coins very tightly and set off through the village. It was very busy, with lots of people about, because the Roman Emperor had said that everybody had to go back to their home village to be counted (so the Romans can get more money out of us, the Rabbi says). Also, the Roman soldiers around were drinking and making a lot of noise: I heard somebody say that they are celebrating the feast of one of their gods - Saturn. It's very strange that the Romans have many gods, surely they can't worship them all? Anyway, there is of course only one God, as the Rabbi says, who helped get our people out of Egypt a long time ago.

I went very carefully, trying to avoid the crowd and the soldiers who were staggering around. You have to be very careful not to upset the Romans - a while ago my friend little Samuel accidentally kicked a ball against a soldier's legs and he got a real thrashing.

Anyway, I bought the last two pies in the shop (he had almost sold out because of all the people around) and set off back past the inn. It was dark by this time. Next to the inn there is an old lean-to stable, where the innkeeper puts a few animals during the winter and I was surprised to see there was a light flickering inside (the animals don't usually read bedtime stories!) So I looked inside and there was a beautiful lady dressed in a blue robe, with her husband! And in the manger used to feed the beasts there was a tiny baby, wrapped in cloths and lying on some straw to keep him warm. They told me that there were no rooms free at the inn next door, but the man had said they could shelter in his stable. I said I was sorry I didn't have a present for the baby, but they both looked a bit hungry, so I asked if they would like the pies, and they were very grateful.

I thought I was going to be in big trouble when I got home and told my mum about the baby and what I had done. But she gave me a big hug and a kiss - and started crying! Funny things, mums!

YPRES POPPY PARADE AND REMEMBRANCE CEREMONY

Last month I joined with others at the Menin Gate, Ypres for the annual Remembrance ceremony which this year was the 105th Anniversary of the Armistice.

On the previous day we went on a tour of the battlefields which included a visit to Langemarck German War Cemetery where more than 44,000 German soldiers are buried. This brought home to me that it was not just “our boys” who gave the ultimate sacrifice but that Germany also lost young men who left behind grieving families.

The weather that day was atrocious, heavy rain filling the fields with standing water. It made me appreciate that, whilst we on the tour could shelter in the warm coach, those men out in the field had nowhere but muddy trenches. They existed in the filth, the cold and the knowledge that at any time they would die, if not from direct shell fire, from disease or drowning in the mud and water filled craters.

We also visited Tyne Cot Cemetery where I paid my respects and laid Remembrance crosses for 2/Lt George Sturdy from Easingwold and to my maternal grandmother’s first husband, L/Cpl Harry Lee. Harry’s sacrifice meant that four generations of my family now live. None could be more true than the line from the Kohima epitaph, “For Your Tomorrow, We Gave Our Today”

On Armistice Day itself we were blessed with sunshine. After attending a service (in Flemish) at St Martin’s Cathedral, we watched the Parade, led by Ypres Surrey Pipes and Drums band, to the Menin Gate where the 11 o’clock Service of Remembrance was held which included a “poppy drop” from the bell tower of the Cloth Hall and the unfurling of the Ypres Peace Flag.
